■ Mark S. Smith

Professor Smith is currently (since 2000) Skirball Professor of Bible and Ancient Near Eastern Studies, Skirball Department of Hebrew and Judaic Studies, at New York University USA. Previously he was Associate Professor of Old Testament at Saint Joseph's University, and Yale University. His research progressed studying in several different Universities in the US including studies in Israel at the Hebrew University Jerusalem, where he stayed as a visiting scholar twice in the years1997 and 2011.

His areas of research are Bible; Israelite religion and culture; Ugaritic literature and religion; Hebrew grammar; and the Dead Sea Scrolls.

He has authored about 15 books and published more than 100 articles. His research work has been highly evaluated by scholars around the world and he has received many awards and honors. Recently he became Elected Fellow of the American Academy for Jewish Research. He has been on the editorial board of several journals, and is acting now as such on the Editorial Board of the Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research and Jewish Quarterly Review.

Recent position: since 2009 she is an Associate Professor at Union Theological Seminary, NY and the Jewish Theological Seminary, NY teaching Archaeology and the Bible and Jerusalem in History, Faith, Memory and Identity. Before she has taught at various universities including New York University, NY; Villanova University, PA; Drexel University, and St. Joseph's University.

Prof. Elizabeth Bloch-Smith is an archaeologist of the Levant, and has been digging in Israel, Cyprus and recently in Zincirli in Turkey. She has published largely on Biblical archeology and her book is: Judahite Burial Practices and Beliefs About the Dead. Journal for the Study of the Old Testament Supplement Series 123; ASOR Monograph Series 7; Sheffield: Sheffield Academic Press (1992).
