### Revisiting Turkish Soft-Power: The Power of Islam or Neo-Ottomanism?

Center for Interdisciplinary Study of Monotheistic Religion (CISMOR), in cooperation with the Research Center for Human Dignity, is organizing a workshop titled "Revisiting Turkish Soft-Power: The Power of Islam or Neo-Ottomanism?" on November 7, 2020.

This workshop examines Turkey's normative influence in its recent history of international relations. Turkey's growing regional presence, especially since 2000s, in the Balkans, Turkic-language areas of the former USSR, and the Middle East has been discussed under the rubric of neo-ottomanism and Islamism. There is also a common assumption that "Turkey's "soft power" efforts have largely focused on the country's ottoman heritage, which resonates well with African, Balkan and Middle Eastern audiences, but has little appeal in the Asia-Pacific Region<sup>1</sup>."

This workshop focuses on the people and countries of "outside ottoman-heritage" with the aim to (re)access Turkey's normative power. This workshop uses the concept of soft-power as an entry point to uncover the ways of thinking about normative influence in international relations. Instead of applying a rigid framework of soft power, we aim to identify the initiatives and practices in each country which include civil society initiatives, cultural diplomacy practices, commercial cultural activities, diaspora communities/networks.
